Order of Australia Medal Recipient—Mary Marsland

Congratulations to Norwood Club Member Mary Marsland who received an Order of Australia Medal (AM) in the recent King's Birthday Honours.

Mary's Award was for significant service to architecture.

Mary was the first female Architect appointed in 1973 to a position in the then Public Buildings Department in the State Government.

Mary's abilities, knowledge and skills were quickly recognised and over her career held a range of roles in the Architecture, Housing and Building Industry, as Chair, Deputy Chair and Board member.

Mary was President of the South Australian Chapter of the Royal Australian Institute of Architects (RAIA) and is a Life Fellow having been a Member since 1987. In the Australia Day Honours in 2005 Mary was awarded a Public Service Medal for her contribution to architecture.



Croquet has been the beneficiary of Mary's strategic skills and experience Mary has been both a Board member of Croquet Australia and Deputy Chair.

Mary has been an AC State representative, State Selector and Club Captain of Norwood over many years.

Mary has not only had an outstanding work career but continues to make numerous contributions to our wonderful game of croquet.

Now Paul has been presented with the mascots, he will be responsible for keeping them entertained and most importantly, keeping them safe from the other teams during the InterState Shield.



What to Consider When Purchasing a Mallet—A Player's Perspective

I have only been playing since 2015 but in that time I have owned four mallets.

I started with a George Wood mallet (NZ made) which at the time cost around \$300. That was a wooden headed mallet with carbon fibre shaft and stainless steel ends weighing in at 3 lbs.

I then progressed to a PFC mallet (NSW produced) which was aluminium head, carbon fibre shaft and weighing 2lb 14ozs. My third mallet is a Dave Trimmer (produced in England) mallet which is carbon fibre and kevlar round head with brass ends and carbon fibre shaft which I had made to match the PFC with the idea that I would use the PFC for GC & the Trimmer for AC. I have given that mallet to my partner who is very happy with it and I now use an identical Trimmer but with a composite face.

I have not used my PFC since I bought my first Trimmer. The PFC has a stiffer shaft and I struggled with it for AC as I found it harder on my joints and I find I can get much better 2 ball shots with the Trimmer. One drawback with a Trimmer is the rather long waiting time as it will be several months.

So, what would I recommend when deciding to buy your first mallet?

My first thought is always, buy the best you can afford! That is not to say the most expensive mallet is necessarily the best. The best for you may not suit someone else.

Most clubs would have a range of club mallets and I would encourage beginners to try as many of them as possible. Fellow club members may have other different mallets and I'm sure they would willingly make them available for any beginner to try.

When you find something that suits you and feels good to play with, then you can start looking around for a second hand one the same, or simply buy a new one made to your specifications.

There are many choices in mallets, so let's start with the handle. I have used a round profile, an oval one and an octagonal one. The octagonal one is really rectangular with the corners rounded off, but there are also square handles. Personally I like either oval or rectangular as there is less chance of the mallet twisting in your hands if you are slightly off line with your hit. If you decide on square I would encourage trying it with the square forming a diamond against the head. Ie not with the sides of the square parallel to the head as I find that will put the points of the square comfortably into the hand. That being said - that

would only be the case if using a Solomon grip. With an Irish grip the square would probably work OK being parallel to the head.

When deciding how long a handle to get I would recommend a handle that, when the mallet is rested on the ground, the handle comes to at least your elbow.

Heads most commonly used are square but round heads are also available and I prefer the latter.

A standard head will be 11" but can be either longer or shorter but most players appear to use 11". Weights of mallets will vary anywhere from just over 2 lbs to in excess of 4lb. Some AC players prefer a heavier mallet because of the 2 ball shots but personally I find 2lb 14 oz suits me.



So, in summary, new mallets that I am aware of will range from around \$200-\$300 up to \$1200-1300 and can be all wood, a combination of wood, metal & carbon fibre/kevlar or metal and carbon fibre. I like the carbon fibre shafts for feel and although I have seen one break, they are more robust than wooden shafts.
